1.4.2 How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

1. We have a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on curriculum by way of pre designed questionnaire. This is analyzed and the feedback is shared by the Principal with the faculty members. However, we also welcome informal feedback from students, parents, alumni and stake holders through discussion which we take a note of. This is communicated by the teachers when they participate in the Board of Studies and syllabus revision workshop.

Informal feedback on curriculum from stakeholders during discussions at PTA meetings, alumni meetings, students and teachers interactions, industry feedback etc. are compiled and communicated to officials at University meetings in the right forum.

2. The college has a mechanism of taking both formal and informal feedback from students and parents. Feedback is taken by the Principal and the IQAC right in the beginning of the semester about quality of teaching. Further, written feedback is also obtained from students in a format recommended by the NAAC committee. This feedback is analysed and communicated to all subject teachers as a follow up and corrective measures are taken.

Feedback is also taken from the parents and alumni informally during visits/ meetings with the Principal and college faculty members to evaluate the quality of teaching learning process.

3. Constructive criticism and feedback are given to the teachers to help them to take corrective action and improve in their performance by the Principal on a one-to-one basis. They are given opportunities for training and re-training to conduct programmes in college and by attending similar programmes in other colleges to help them to perform better at the work place.

2.3.2 Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

The college has a professional psychological counsellor Ms. Yvette Lee, who is available twice a week for students. She guides and counsels them on problems related to their studies, personal life and social life. Since most of our students are employed, they need to be counselled on 'work-life balance' and time management. Our students are very stressed on account of the peculiar family backgrounds and the many constraints in their life as a result of which their academic performance is affected.

The teaching staff members are also available before the lecture hours to solve students' problems. The teachers make them feel free to consult for any problem and constantly mentor and guide them.

Initially when students enter the F.Y.B.Com. they face difficulty in adjusting to the degree college atmosphere, where they need some mentoring. By the time they reach the second year students may face problems related to peer relationships which need some kind of psycho-social support.

At the T.Y.B.Com. level most of the students need some career guidance or counselling to resolve academic stress. In all these stages as a policy the college provides appropriate support, guidance and mentoring.

College also has a Women Development Cell for girl students to lodge complains, participate in programs on women's issue and address all the problems faced by women and girl students in the campus. Advocate Vijaylaxmi Saini is a senior member on the cell who advices girl students on Human Rights and Women Rights.

Slow learners are encouraged by the teachers to come and meet personally in order to resolve their doubts and difficulties. Aiming at slow learners, difficult topics are revised by the professors in the classrooms.

Thus, revision helps the slow learners as well as other students. Extra lectures have been taken for the slow learners for the difficult topics.

To develop the participative management culture, we have introduced committee form of Management for most of the important functions, both academic and non-academic. Committees such as Gymkhana committee, Students' Council, Examination committee, Canteen committee, Anti Ragging committee, Admission committee includes number of teachers and students. These committees always meet, discuss, take decisions and enforce those decisions through proper communication channels with intimation to the Principal and Heads of Departments. In fact, all decisions at the institutional level are taken through participative management, and members of each committee are aware of the statutory provisions and college policy. Levels of participative management – teacher is member of her department where she reports to the head of the department. The head of the department reports directly to the Principal. These are the level of participative management. A teacher may be a member of one committee while she may head another committee. The in-charge of the committee is responsible for planning and implementing his/ her task and timely reporting.

Curriculum Development:

Mahatma Education Society's Mahatma Night Degree College of Arts and Commerce is affiliated to the University of Mumbai. Being affiliated to the University we have to adhere to the syllabus offered by the University. All the same, we do participate in all the meetings called by the Board Of Studies during their review and syllabus revision sessions

***** Teaching and Learning:

Our teachers follow lecture method and other teaching learning methods to make the learning more interactive and interesting. The teachers interact with students during lecture to solve their difficulties especially for the subjects like Accountancy, Taxation and Mathematics. Teachers also try to spare some time at the end of the lecture to invite questions. Moreover, students can meet teachers informally in the staff room before lecture.

The college gives the opportunity for the collaborative learning by organising: i. English speaking for employability - Teach India Programme in collaboration with Times of India, Mumbai. ii. Youth Leadership and People Skill Programme in collaboration with TISS, Mumbai iii. Complimentary training programme of Overview of Financial Market in collaboration with BSE, Mumbai.

The College organises guest lectures on sensitive and other emerging issues which allow the students to think independently and make them socially responsible citizens. Besides, the college also organises field visits.

Examination and Evaluation

Being a permanently affiliated college of the University of Mumbai, the examinations and evaluation process have to be conducted as per the University norms. In the beginning of the academic year an academic calendar is prepared considering the total number of instructional days by the IQAC with tentative dates for various academic, curricular and co-curricular activities and shared with all teachers. The same are uploaded on the college website for benefit of all stakeholders. Due care is taken to allot quality time for the ISSC at the end of the semester.

* Research and Development

Though we do not have research committee, the IQAC of the college undertakes the functions of the

research committee and supports, guides and mentors teachers and students undertaking research activities, such as writing research papers, minor research projects and M. Phil. and doctoral works.

The Mahatma Education Society under the aegis of the Research Forum has taken another initiative with the inception of the "MES Student Seminar Series", in which the students from various departments are nominated to present their field projects undertaken by them.

❖ Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation

Library: The library is open from 11 am to 8 pm. Students make use of library and reading room producing their bar coded identity cards. The library offers the book bank scheme SMAF – Student Mutual Aid Fund. Notices are displayed out on the notice board and announcement made in class inviting students to apply for the book bank scheme. Students are selected on the criteria of their results and annual income and given a complete set of text book for nominal refundable deposit of 500 rupees. At the end of the year after the examinations the students return the book sets and claim their deposits. This scheme is available for first year, second year and third year students. Additional books will be issued to the students during the examination season. During vacation also library is open till 6.00 p.m. It is located on the fifth floor of the college campus building.

ICT: the computer labs have separate teachers and students corner. Printers and internet facility are provided in the lab. Various computer courses are offered to the students with a nominal fee at their convenient timings. The computer lab has confidential arrangements for downloading the question papers of the university examinations sent online and later take the required number of copies. Computer labs are located on the first floor and fifth floor. Both hardware and software support is available to ensure smooth conduct of University examinations as per specified norms.

Other: DTP and Xrox Centre, IQAC Room, Auditorium, Conference Room

Human Resource Management

The Principal ensures that all the staff are sent for In-service training as prescribed by the UGC Human Resource Development Centre. The orientation programme, refresher courses, short term courses etc. The teachers are encouraged to undertake Ph.D. Doctoral Programmes, Minor Research Projects and publish papers and participate in seminars and conferences. They are also encouraged to attend the FDPs organized by the college. The Principal encourages the teachers to apply for CAS Career Advancement Scheme career when they are due for promotion.

Industry Interaction / Collaboration

The placement cell of the college interacts with the industry and invites them to the campus for placement activity. The placement cell of the college invites various institutions like Banks, Insurance Companies and soft skills and career building institutions the former for campus placement and to the latter for making them employable. Institutions like Techno-Serve – TNS India Foundation have conducted the YEP Youth Employability Programme for the students of T.Y.B.Com. The other initiatives are the TISS Tata Institute of Social Sciences' YLPS Leadership Training and People Skills Programme; Bombay Stock Exchange's Capital Market Investment programme; SEBI Securities and Exchange Board of India's Investment Opportunities programme. With these programmes the students get an opportunity to improve their skills and become more employable. The experts who come from the industry to deliver these programmes help the students to get an insight into the happenings in the industry.

❖ Admission of Students

As per the admission procedure laid down by the University of Mumbai, the student has to fill the prescribed online pre-admission registration form in which he/she has to select the college in which he/she is interested to take admission. As per the Mumbai University norms, a separate admission committee is

formed every year headed by the Principal of the college. The faculty members are allotted admission duty on rotation basis. As a policy, teachers teaching in F.Y.B.Com. are given preferences for admission duty. The college believes in the concept of "Power of a second chance". Thus, we also consider and admit students who are willing to complete their higher education after a long gap. Hence, our admission process continues till the end of the admission period even after other colleges in neighbouring localities complete their admission process.
